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Superintendent's Report March 17, 2014

- I. Prior to this past Wednesday's closing we had reached an agreement with the Madison Education Association on revisions to the school calendar necessitated by the seven inclement weather closings we had suffered through at that point in the school year. With this past Wednesday's closing it will now be necessary to extend the school year by one day for our students with their last day now being Thursday, June 12th. The professional development we had planned for June 12th will now move to June 13th, which will be the last day for teachers (barring no additional closings). The revised calendar for the remainder of the 2013-14 school year can be found later in this packet.
- II. You will receive an update on the recent 5th grade camping trip at this meeting. From what I understand, some of the 5th grade teachers, 5th grade students, and high school chaperones plan to attend the meeting.
- III. Mary Radant is requesting a medical leave commencing March 25th. She is anticipating the leave will be for approximately 6 weeks, but the exact length of the leave will be determined later by her surgeon. It is my recommendation that you approve her request for a FMLA medical leave from March 25, 2014 through the period of time her surgeon verifies she is disabled and that she be allowed to use accumulated sick leave for that period of time.
- IV. We have continued to gather data and research a Balanced School Year (BSY) option for the 2014-15 school year. Ryan has prepared a power point that summarizes where we are at in this process and we will review that information in detail with you at this meeting. We currently have firm commitments from the parents of more than 200 elementary students for the BSY for 2014-15, and that number continues to grow. While we still have significant work to do to prepare for implementation of the BSY this July, we are now at the point where we can confidently recommend you approve the BSY option for the 2014-15 school year. Dana will be out of town for this meeting but Ryan and I appreciate her meeting with us this past Monday to review our current BSY data. As I stated at the conclusion of that meeting – this is a very important decision, but it has been our goal to be as diligent as possible in our research and planning so ultimately it could also be a very easy decision for you to make. The administrative team is now strongly in support of providing a BSY option for interested elementary families for the 2014-15 school year and we are asking for your approval at this meeting.

- V. This past month Jennifer and I have spent a great deal of time working on revisions to the 2013-14 budget. We will continue that work over the weekend and have a proposed revision for your consideration at this meeting. The process continues to become more and more challenging. A few examples of what I mean – there used to be two retirement rates, now there are at least 26; when the fall enrollment count was completed we used to know the amount of State Aid that we would receive for the school year, now we have to keep track of the number of students that move in and out of the District throughout the year, and the number of days they are enrolled here, then, when mid February rolls around, we can finally calculate our State Aid for the year; most of our State revenue used to come to us via the Foundation Allowance, now the Governor and legislature keep us guessing as to how much "Best Practice" and "performance" funding we will receive, again making it impossible to budget accurately until those amounts become known mid way through the school year. Governor Snyder and the State legislature have not only underfunded K-12 public education they have also made our funding much more difficult to accurately project.
- VI. Since your last meeting we have received formal approval to renovate the old elementary gymnasium into a satellite kitchen and serving area for our younger elementary students and to convert the former stage area into two music classrooms. As I mentioned last month, the bid opening for that work will take place on April 15th. It is my plan to have everything in place for your consideration at your April 21st meeting.
- VII. A couple of weeks ago I sent you information about a training opportunity for Board members and superintendents on a new superintendent evaluation tool. (A copy of the flyer announcing the training is also included in this packet.) As I pointed out in my earlier email -

Legislation was passed in 2011 mandating a new evaluation process for teachers and administrators that was supposed to take effect in 2012. The legislation was poorly thought through prior to its passage; there was really no comprehension by the legislators of the magnitude of what was required by the legislation. A committee was appointed and given a deadline to figure things out. The committee failed miserably in reaching the unrealistic deadline that was given to it, so a different committee was appointed and a new deadline was established. This past summer the 2nd committee completed its work and submitted a report to the legislature and Governor. Some hearings have been held on the committee's recommendation but nothing appears to being even close to finalized legislatively. The legislature might well approve the committee's work, and probably should approve it, but who knows what or when they will do something.

Workshops are now being held across the State on how to implement the new evaluation process recommended by the committee (but not yet approved by the legislature). One set of workshops is for principals covering how to evaluate teachers, another set of workshops is for Board members and superintendents on how to evaluate superintendents. Nate and Ryan will be attending the workshop on principal evaluations. It is basically a 2 day training and somewhat expensive, but no where nearly as expensive as the training for the superintendent evaluation workshop which is \$1,000.

Included in this packet is information about a Board member and superintendent evaluation workshop. This is where I struggle with a recommendation for you. We are fortunate that the LISD has been able to have this training brought to Lenawee County. That certainly makes it more convenient for Board members to attend. The downside is should we spend \$1,000 and ask some of you to give up 2 evenings to learn how to do something that might not be approved? Then again, it might be approved. We will probably be kicking ourselves if it is approved and some of you have to travel somewhere else in the State for the training. We will definitely be kicking ourselves if we spend \$1,000 and some of you attend the training and then it is not approved.

- VIII. I know each of you join me in offering condolences to Kyle, his brothers, and their families on the loss of Kyle's father, Frank. As I mentioned in a previous email, during my 45 years at Madison no one has matched Frank's generosity to the District. I know Frank's children and grandchildren were at the top of his list, but Madison School was also something Frank held in very high regard. Frank served on the Madison Board of Education from July 1973 through June 1981, and was the Board President for the last five years of that service. It is hard to imagine what things would look like today if Frank had not facilitated the purchase of the land where our 3rd & 4th grade wing is now housed from his sister and also sold us the property where the baseball and softball fields are located. In both cases for less than 50% of their true value. After securing the land from Frank for the baseball and softball fields we discovered we needed an additional 1 ½ acres to lay the fields out properly. When I shared that information with Frank he simply gave us the additional land. Frank had a vision for what was needed to provide the programming our students deserved and he did everything he could to make that possible. I also saw the softer side of Frank when he lost his grandson, Bryant, when the child was only in first grade. That was a very, very tough time.
 - IX. Both our girls and boys varsity basketball teams won league and district championship within the past couple of weeks. It is almost unbelievable, but it had been 31 years since our boys had won a district championship.

I am sure you are also aware that we recently retired the first two athletic

uniforms in the school's history. We did our best to keep that ceremony a secret and it certainly was a surprise to both Dawn and Jeff. There was a great story in the Telegram on Sunday, March 9th, that I would refer you to if you have not already seen the article. I don't know how many uniforms will be retired in the future, but, from my perspective, this is the start of establishing an athletic hall of fame. I certainly do not foresee everyone selected for the hall of fame having their jersey retired, but some might. It is my intent to have a committee appointed to work on establishing criteria for membership in the athletic hall of fame.

On a related, and parallel, endeavor I would also like to get a committee in place to establish criteria for an alumni hall of fame. The alumni hall of fame would recognize any Madison graduate who has made a significant contribution to the District, community, or world since his/her graduation from Madison High School.

Jim Hartley Superintendent Board Report Kristin Thomas, Principal Madison High School March 17, 2014

- I. Michigan Merit Exam The Michigan Merit exam was administered to our juniors on March 4th, 5th, & 6th. The first day of testing students take the ACT. Day two, students take the WorkKeys tests, and day three they take the Michigan content tests in Math, Science, & Social Studies (much like the high school version of the MEAP test). I can tell you that I was very pleased with the effort and attitude our students demonstrated on these days. Students clearly recognized the significance of the tests and appeared to really want to do well. I think this is a direct result of the work our staff does in preparing and educating students on the importance of these tests and their potential to provide them with future opportunities. We hope to have preliminary scores in early May.
- II. MIPHY Survey The Michigan Profile for Healthy Youth survey provides research information regarding the health behaviors of 9th & 11th graders. The survey will ask about behavior and attitude related to nutrition, physical activity, injuries, tobacco, alcohol, and other drug use. It will also ask about sexual behaviors that cause AIDS, other sexually transmitted diseases, and pregnancy.
- III. Celebration Assembly The high school took a few moments on Friday, March 7th to celebrate the many achievements of our students. The students recognized were:

Brad Anschuetz , Principal Madison Middle School Board Report March 17, 2014

- I. At the conclusion of this year's second trimester, 81% of our eighth grade **students will earn credit** for Civics, Bio Med, Advanced Computers, or Art (two trimesters of block schedule in 8th grade equals one trimester of HS credit). Another 20% of our eighth grade students are scheduled to earn a second credit for Civics the third trimester. To accomplish this in one trimester, Mrs. Matthews has agreed to teach the class first hour and during Forum; this way the class meets every day. In addition, 38% of our 8th graders will earn HS credit for Algebra I at the conclusion of the year. The advanced math credit, however, does not free up a student's future scheduling options, but rather it allows a student to advance further in the math curriculum.
- **II.** Congratulations to the Madison Middle School girls basketball teams. For the third year in a row, the 7th and 8th grade girls won the Britton-Deerfield Middle School Tournament for their respective grade level. Both teams finished at 9-1.
- **III.** Our sixth grade students will participate in the **Reproductive Health Educational Program** prior to break. Nurse Ellen Young will be our lead instructor. She will be assisted by Mr. Powers and Ms. Hogle. Eighth grade students will receive the training following the break.
- **IV.** The Language Arts Department will be hosting a **Spring Showcase on March 20**th from 6:00 7:00 p.m. to highlight student work. The sixth grade teachers will be hosting the second annual "Innovation Day". Their innovative designs and presentations will be showcased in the cafeteria. The seventh grade will be showcasing their autobiographical poems and augmented reality representations. Finally, eighth graders will be presenting "Living History" as students choose to act out characters from books they have read or showcase their essays about the chosen Holocaust ID cards.
- V. There are currently 67 students scheduled to attend the Chicago Trip from March 26th- 28th. A final informational meeting for students was held on March 6th. Weather predictions for Chicago call for a high of 50 degrees and a low of 25 degrees. With spring break being late this year the trip is a week later as well. Hopefully, this will allow time for spring weather to kick into effect. Students not attending the Chicago Trip will be able to visit the Henry Ford Museum on March 27th. Mrs. Bonnie Dietrich and a group of parents are hosting a Lock-in on Saturday, March 22 from 6:00 p.m. 9:00 p.m. to raise funds for snacks and water on the busses. This will be an opportunity for students to play puttputt golf, take part in a 3-on-3 basketball tournament, or take part in the contest "a minute-to-win-it". Prizes have been donated by the Spotted Cow!
- **VI. MEAP scores have been released to the public.** Mr. Rowe has included a chart in his report that outlines Madison's scores in comparison to other county districts. For this year's MEAP, the middle school scores are the 7th & 8th grade scores. Since the test is given in October it assesses what the students learned in the year prior. The seventh and eighth grade reading scores are phenomenal, as well as the 7th grade writing score. This is the third time in four years that our writing scores have finished first in the county. The year we did not finish first we finished second. The middle school math scores and 8th grade science scores are both above the state and county averages. The social studies scores lag behind.

- **VII.** The MMS 7th & 8th Band performed at Festival on March 1st. All three judges awarded the band a rating of II for their performance pieces. The sight reading judge also awarded Madison a rating of II. Mrs. Zeckner reports that the students performed extremely well and that she was very proud of them.
- **VIII.** We had 65% of our parents attend Parent Teacher Conferences in the winter. This compares to 61% last year at this time. Historically, prior to moving the second conference from the spring to the winter, we averaged 53 55% for the spring conference date. The fall conference participation averages around 71 -73%.
- **IX.** The **Madison Middle School Art Department** recently sent five of our students' art work to the Region #3 K 12 Art Show, held at Adrian College, in the Vallade Gallery, Shipman Library. Those students with pieces in the show were Mahala Raleigh, Sierra Hernandez, Jacob Swanson, Lauren Perez, and Isabel Muhl. Two pieces were chosen to go on to state (Lauren Perez & Mahala Raleigh). One piece was chosen to be in the top 100 travelling art show (Mahala Raleigh). Congratulations to Mahala, her peers, and Mrs. McDowell!
- **X.** The 8th grade teachers are currently reviewing the **EXPLORE Test results** with students. The EXPLORE Test is a product of the ACT College Readiness program. Research indicates that students who take the EXPLORE Test are more likely to score higher on the ACT during their junior year of high school. This statistic is due in part to the familiarity of taking a timed, high-stakes test. Furthermore, the information gained from the EXPLORE test will be used to meet the academic needs of the student.

Students will receive a report that includes a composite score in English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science. This report will also inform the student if they are below, at, or above the benchmark scores that predict readiness for college. Finally, a career profile is provided that matches the World-of-Work Map with a student's strengths and interests. The career profile will further enhance the High School Guidance Counselor's ability to tailor a student's curriculum to best prepare them for the rigors of post-secondary education.

- **XI.** The second year of the **Girls on Track** program is underway (16 young ladies). This program is headed by Mrs. Emily Gafford and Mrs. Danyelle Matthews. This is a proven program that makes a difference regarding the empowerment of young ladies. Students learn to set goals and move forward towards achieving those goals while coping with adolescent issues.
- **XII.** Second trimester exams are underway this week. Trying to keep the learning continuum moving forward with the number of "Act of God" days has been a challenge for our faculty. Students easily lose focus when not in a routine.
- XIII. Mrs. Judy Mann has instituted a program titled "Homework Hero". Every month a sixth, seventh, and eighth grade student who consistently completes his or her assignments to the best of their ability will be honored. Quotes from these students about their practices will be featured in MMS publications.



I. Technology Needs - This year the elementary added a laptop cart to our student technology resources. This cart, equipped with 30 laptops, is used constantly. We use it for classroom practice and projects at every grade level and for technology classes. Three times a year, during NWEA assessment, our computer labs are occupied for approximately four weeks. When this happens, we are in desperate need of computers. We would like to purchase at least one more laptop cart. These carts can essentially turn a classroom into a temporary computer lab. Students can use the laptops for anything a desktop computer can do. Because the cart is used non-stop, and scheduling for classes has become challenging, we are asking the board's support in the purchase of a second cart. The cost of this cart would be covered by remaining elementary budget funds and student activity funds, if this is approved.

II. Spring 2014 Michigan Interim Assessment Pilot – As you know the MEAP assessment will no longer be administered in the fall. Nor will any paper and pencil assessment be administered by the state. Instead, we will be participating in whatever online test the state decides on in the spring. In order to determine our readiness as a district for online testing, the state is offering a \$17,000 grant to participate in a pilot assessment. In order to earn the funding, at least 20% of the district's student population must participate. Our 3rd through 5th graders will be taking both the Michigan Science and Social Studies tests, beginning on March 24th. Lee Skarha has had a lot of work to create a new server and install software on our computers. The grant will help assist our technology needs in better facilitating next year's assessment.

III. Reading Month - We are having a reading fiesta in the elementary throughout March in celebration of reading month. Our Soup and Story Night that usually kicks off reading month has been postponed until March 25th. At Soup and Story Night, we'll have a children's author reading to our students. Students have set reading goals for themselves and monitor their progress weekly when they visit the library. If they have met their goal for the week, their name goes into a drawing for bikes that have been donated to the school by Kiwanis.

IV. Standing up to Bullying Month – On February 28th, student council facilitated a "Stand Up to Bullying" day. Zeke Clymer and his dad, CJ designed pink t-shirts for the day, our students all signed a poster that is hanging in the 5th grade hallway, and students and staff decorated the school pink (the official color of stand up to bullying month). In addition our student council plastered our walls and lockers with sticky notes of kindness. Students completed a pink paper chain activity as well. Student Council did a great job uniting the school for this great cause. Thank you to Ms. Metevia, Ms. Pawson and student council for their great work.

V. Jump Rope for Heart - Mary Anschuetz and Rick McNeil led our school in the annual Jump Rope for Heart Event. Students jumped in honor or memory of friends and family on February 28th, raising over \$4,44.00. All throughout the month of February, during morning announcements, we learned about our hearts and heart-healthy facts.

VI. Parking Lot — Our parking lot has been a problem as of late. We appreciate the efforts of our maintenance staff, but it still remains an issue. Due to the snow, we have lost our gravel lot, where many of our teachers park. In addition, we have lost two rows of parking and an exit lane. Although we do our best to monitor and assist, it continues to be hectic and frustrating for our parents at dismissal time. We will continue to help keep the process as smooth as possible.
