## Superintendent's Report April 21, 2014

I. As a reminder, the Consolidated Election legislation a few years ago resulted in all Board of Education members now being elected at the General Election in November of even numbered years. The Board seats are for six year terms and during the three next November General Election cycles (November 2014, 2016, and 2018) Madison voters will be electing three, two, and two Board members. Terms for current Madison Board members expire:
2014 - Dana, Mark, and Ruben
2016 - Kyle and Nancy
2018 - Julie and Natasha
I certainly encourage Dana, Mark, and Ruben to seek reelection. Nominating petitions must have a minimum of six signatures and a maximum of twenty. Petitions must be returned to Arnie Harper, the Madison Township Clerk, by no later than 4:00 p.m. on July $22^{\text {nd }}$.
II. We have a special treat for you at this meeting. After concluding our monthly reports, and the Consent Agenda, some of Shannon Mound's high school Poetry Slam students will make a presentation for you. It is extremely rewarding to watch Shannon's students perform. They have done a great job in their first year of performing.
III. Bids for the renovation of the old elementary gymnasium and stage area were received and opened on April $15^{\text {th }}$. Overall the bids came in about where our architect, Dave Siler, had projected. As of the time I am writing this report we still need a little clarification on one of the floor covering bids. The company was significantly lower than the other bidders but they did not include the asbestos abatement for the old gym floor.
IV. Jamie Weible has resigned as the Varsity Competitive Cheer Coach and Kris Isom is recommending that Emily Gafford be hired for that position. Emily has prior experience as the Competitive Cheer Coach at Madison.
V. I had mentioned at a previous meeting that there was a proposal in the State Legislature to provide $\$ 2$ million statewide to assist school districts that were interested in starting a balanced school year program. The requirements to qualify for that funding have finally been published on the MDE website. Madison qualifies for the funding because we are part of the Community Eligibility Option providing free breakfasts and lunches for our elementary students. However, we do not meet the criteria to receive
priority for the funding so we are uncertain as to how viable our chances are for funding from this grant. \$2 million for the entire State is really not much. The only way we would receive funding is if there is money left after the priority districts were funded. It all comes down to how many districts apply. We believe it will be very difficult, if not impossible, for many districts to meet the May $1^{\text {st }}$ application deadline. We certainly could not have met that deadline if we were not already well along in our planning process. Therefore, we definitely believe we should apply for the funding.

One of the requirements to file an application is that the Board of Education must pass a resolution stating "the District will implement for the first time a year-round instructional calendar that will begin in 2014-15 for at least one school operated by the District and committing to providing the year-round instructional calendar in each of those schools for at least three school years". I know we had not previously stated that we intend to offer the BSY for a minimum of three years, but I also believe we know it will take at least that long to determine the success of the program. I am recommending you pass the required resolution and authorize us to submit an application.

If we are lucky enough to receive funding it will have to be used for non reoccurring expenses. I would like to apply for funds to assist with the installation of the air conditioning in the new music rooms and the cafeteria. The maximum grant is $\$ 750,000$ per district.
VI. Ryan will provide you with a BSY update as we continue to work on details for the start of school on July $28^{\text {th }}$.
VII. I spent several days during spring break doing additional work on the projected 2014-15 budget. It is a frustrating endeavor. The Governor has made his school funding proposal for the coming year and the House and Senate have both made their proposals. Hard to tell where they will end up but they are supposed to reach an agreement by the end of May. Then all we need to know is how many students we will have next October and on the March 2015 count date. (10\% of school funding used to be based on enrollment the prior March, now it is March of the current year.) We will also need to know how many students will move to or from Madison and another Michigan public school between those two count dates. I have an older crystal ball and it is just not giving me accurate enrollment data any more.

In spite of the above you have to approve a tentative 2014-15 budget and we have to post it on our website to finish qualifying for the "Best Practice" funding. A very, very preliminary 14-15 budget is including in this packet for your approval. I can guarantee the budget you will review at your June meeting will have significant changes.
VIII. A month ago I mentioned the urgent need that we have for a school bus. Jerry has since acquired bids from two companies and we are in the process of analyzing the bids. The bids are very close, $\$ 91,584$ vs. $\$ 92,261$, or a difference of $\$ 677.00$. With that minimal of a difference I want to be certain I fully understand the difference in the equipment on the two vehicles. We also have a bid of \$94,915.00 for a stock bus that has much heavier equipment. While it would be helpful to have that bus this spring I am not certain the additional equipment on the bus justifies the additional expense. We have not shared any of the bids with the suppliers but we are aware that the company with the stock bus is very anxious to sell it. We have made them aware that if the price of the stock bus was more aligned to the price of the other bus that they had bid we could become interested in the stock bus. I am planning to spend some time this weekend more carefully analyzing the bids before making a recommendation on the purchase. I will also not be surprised to receive a revised price on the stock bus before Monday's meeting.
IX. We need to conduct a student discipline hearing at this meeting for a high school student. I believe the parents will request that the hearing be held in closed session.
X. The FAN group met a month ago and is in the process of planning additional fund raisers to complete the renovation of the building adjacent to the baseball and softball fields. They have another meeting scheduled for Tuesday, April $22^{\text {nd }}$ at 6:00 p.m. Work has progressed well this past year thanks to the $1 / 4$ mill approved by the taxpayers and some labor donated by FAN members. The main tasks remaining are installation of a stairway and some doors and, most significantly, the heating system. They are about $\$ 75,000$ short of what they need to complete the work. They are considering asking the Board for a loan to be repaid over the next few years so they can get the project completed and students can start using the facility. I am waiting for a more complete plan from FAN, and I am also working on our cash flow, before I place anything on a Board agenda for your consideration.

I. Our second trimester Merit Trip will be to MJR Cinemas. An astounding 241 out of 372 students (65\%) qualified. That is a significant number of students to meet the academic, behavioral, and attendance requirements to earn the right to attend the merit trip.
II. Congratulations to our seventh grade choir students and their Director, Mr. Dave Ripper. The seventh grade choir earned the right to compete at the Michigan State Vocal Music Festival with their performance at regionals. Their state performance will be next Friday, April 25, at Holt High School.
III. Sixth grade students just completed this year's Reproductive Health Educational Program prior to break. Nurse Ellen Young facilitates this program for the sixth grade. She is assisted by Mr. Josh Powers and Ms. Jill Hogle. Nurse Young is a great resource for our district.
IV. There were 133 students earning VIP honors for the second trimester (36\%). Another 16 students were recognized for making the Honor Roll (All A's and B's, with one "C").
V. Quiz Bowl competitions are starting up this month. Madison Middle School is home of the defending $6^{\text {th }}$ grade champions. There is a rich history of success for Madison teams competing in the Quiz Bowl, sponsored by the LISD, with all of our grades. Mrs. Jill Brandeberry has been our coach for the sixth grade for a number of years and recruited her peers to coach the $7^{\text {th }}$ and $8^{\text {th }}$ grade teams.
VI. Mrs. Jordan published a testing schedule for spring NWEA tests. The assessment window will be May $6^{\text {th }}-22^{\text {nd }}$. These results will be compared to last spring in order to determine who made adequate yearly progress. NWEA scores and MEAP scores are tied to teacher and administrator evaluations.
VII. The Chicago Trip was another successful $8^{\text {th }}$ grade trip (fourth overall since 2010). Students made new friendships that did not exist prior to the trip. Seeing peers and teachers outside of the school routine helps one another to see people in a different light. For the first time in their life some of our students were involved in a formal dining experience that involved more than one fork and table manners. The exhibits and
museums rounded out three days of an immersion into the humanities. World experiences are one of the biggest predictors of a student's success on a standardized test. Some of our students would not receive these experiences without this trip. We are extremely thankful that Mrs. Danyelle Matthews volunteers her time and energy make this trip possible. Mrs. Mindy Jordan, Mrs. Bonnie Dietrich, Mrs. Deanna Garno, Mrs. Renee Forche, and Mrs. Kris Isom also gave up time away from their families to chaperone the trip. A letter from the tour guide is enclosed. This letter speaks very highly of our students and the manner in which they conducted themselves on the trip.

Almost every winter we have a gain and not a loss for the financial report. This year we have a loss due to the purchase of the wrestling mats as well as a very rough winter in regards to the weather. We lost 2 home varsity basketball gates, our cheer invitational, varsity wrestling and 4
junior high basketball games. This is the worst winter for cancelations without makeup dates we have ever had in Michigan. All of these games/meets would have had a positive income that would be close to breaking even for the season.

With that being said I am happy to say that this past winter athletic season was the most successful in Madison school history for all of our sports. It was the first time that our girls and boys basketball teams won the TCC conference as well as the District tournament. It was also the first time that our varsity wrestling team won the District tournament (there was not a District tournament when we won the state titles in the $70^{\prime}$ 's). Our bowling teams were also very successful. Although they were not in a league this year we would have finished second if we had been. The cheer team finished $1^{\text {st }}$ or $2^{\text {nd }}$ in four of their invitationals and just missed out on advancing to the state meet. The boys' junior high $8^{\text {th }}$ team finished second at the Madison Tournament and the $7^{\text {th }}$ and $8^{\text {th }}$ grade girls' basketball teams won their tournament at BrittonDeerfield. Our combined trophy count for the winter season was an impressive 16. Granted, it is not all about "bringing home the hardware" but it sure is an added positive that gave the school atmosphere a boost. The kids are very proud as well as everyone associated with these programs and the school. We have a great coaching staff and a wonderful group of kids to work with.
