# **Spring Means Preparing for Severe Weather**

With approaching spring weather we remind you that, by Board policy, if it is safe to do so, Madison students will be dismissed and sent home if a tornado warning is issued for our immediate area. If we do not have enough time to transport students home, or if it is deemed unsafe to do so, students will be sheltered in designated areas of the building.

Please be certain you have made arrangements in advance so your children know what to do if a tornado warning results in the early closure of school.

Our Alert Now system will be utilized to inform parents of an early school dismissal. All after school and weekend activities will also normally be cancelled if a tornado warning is issued during that time period. The only after school events that might continue as scheduled would be graduation, Honors Night, and participation in State athletic tournaments. School administrators will make a determination of the continuation of those events after consulting with NOAA weather and other local resources.

Any decisions made to transport students, shelter in place, or cancel events will be made with the safety of our students as a priority.

Please be sure that your contact information on file in the school office is up to date so you are able to receive Alert Now messages.

# Attendance: A Key to Your Child's Success

Schools are responsible for teaching your child, but schools can't do their job if your child is absent. Learning builds day by day. A child who misses a day of school misses a day of learning.

Research shows that children who are in school most of the time do better on standardized tests. Being late to school also hurts a child's learning. A student who is 10 minutes late every day will miss 30 hours of instruction during the year.

Children can copy notes or make up an assignment, but they can never get back what is most important: the discussions, the questions, the explanations by the teacher, and the thinking that makes learning come alive.

Your child's success in school depends on having a solid educational background – one that can only be gained through regular school attendance.

# Here's how you can improve your child's attendance:

- Talk with your child about why it's important to attend school regularly.
- Avoid scheduling family trips or doctor appointments during school hours.
- Make sure your child stays healthy by eating nutritious food and getting enough sleep and exercise.
- Don't accept excuses for why your child "must" miss or be late for school.
- Discuss with your child what happened at school each day.
- Support school rules and consequences for skipping class and being tardy.
- Show your child why education is important. Give specific examples of how education helps people succeed.
- Lead by example. If children see parents taking off work for no real reason, they may expect to be able to do the same thing.

# **Kindergarten Readiness Class**



Please provide the office your child's certified birth certificate, immunization records and proof of residency (such as a utility bill, cable bill, rent/mortgage statement or insurance or property tax document).

# **Balanced School Year Registration Open**

Elementary families interested in registering for the Balanced School Year (BSY) option for the 2016-17 school year are asked to complete a commitment form by Friday, April 29.

Students currently enrolled in the BSY program do not need to complete this form. Current BSY students will remain on the BSY schedule unless written notification of the intent to return to the Traditional School Year (TSY) calendar is received by April 29.

At this time, teachers currently teaching on the BSY calendar will remain on the BSY calendar for 2016-17. We will re-evaluate the need for additional BSY teachers based on the number of students who enroll and will announce any staffing changes at a later date.

The 2016-17 BSY school year is tentatively set to begin on Monday, July 25, 2016. Just as in years past, students on both the TSY and BSY calendars will end on the same day in June.

# **Spring M-STEP Testing**

The Michigan Department of Education (MDE) has released its M-STEP testing dates for spring 2016. These date windows for testing are listed below. More specific testing information will be shared with families as the dates draw closer. It is important that your child arrives at school well rested, relaxed, and ready to do his or her best on these statewide assessments.

Grade 3 testing window: April 25-May 9

Third grade will take English Language Arts and Math.

Grade 4 testing window: May 9-23

Fourth grade will take English Language Arts, Math, and Science.

Grade 5 testing window: April 11-25

Fifth grade will take English Language Arts, Math, and Social Studies.

Grade 6 testing window: April 25-May 13

Sixth grade will take English Language Arts and Math.

Grade 7 testing window: May 9-27

Seventh grade will take English Language Arts, Math, and Science.

Grade 8 testing window: April 11-29

Eighth grade will take English Language Arts, Math, and Social Studies.

Grade 11 testing dates: April 18 & 19

Juniors will take Science and

Social Studies.

The Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) testing window for high school students is May 10-27. Students will be evaluated on their academic progress in Reading, Language Usage, and Mathematics.



# **Medication Reminder:**

Please do not send any medication to school with your child. If he or she is to have medication during the day, a parent will need to deliver the medication to the office in the original container and fill out a Medication Form. Nurse Ellen will see that the medication is dispensed properly during the school day.

# **Head Bump Protocol:**

Accidents happen and bumps and bruises can be a common part of an active child's lifestyle. If a student bumps his or her head at school, Nurse Ellen will assess the injury, contacting parents as necessary. If the injury seems minor, she will send home a form with details about what happened to cause the injury along with a list of symptoms. If the child's condition should change at home, parents are encouraged to take this form with them to the doctor for a follow up.

Teachers are made aware of head bumps and will contact Nurse Ellen if there is any change in a child's condition.

are if you've applied for college, credit, or a job someone else has. You may be surprised to know more than just your friends may be checking out your online profile. In 2014, 35 percent of college admissions offices visited applicants' social media pages to learn more about them.

Be sure that your online presence is presentable by:

- Carefully selecting your username: "CutiePatootie@email.com" or "@toughguy14" may be fun, but something simple like your first initial and last name is more professional.
- 2. Thinking before you post: You may be tempted to speak your mind on social media, but think twice before flying off the handle.
- 3. Not "liking" everything: Pages you follow and recent likes show up in newsfeeds. Be sure you are following only groups you want to be associated with.
- **4.** Keeping it clean: Make sure any photos you share are school and workplace appropriate; this means watch your clothing choices, inappropriate gestures, and the groups you are pictured in.
- **5.** Checking your security settings: Set your profiles to "private" wherever possible.

# What is Team Time?

The mission of the Madison School District is to enable each student to develop his or her full potential to be successful. We understand that students do not come to us as 'one size fits all' learners, and have different learning styles and rates.

In 2008-2009, we implemented a Multi-Tiered Support System, otherwise known as the Response to Intervention model, in kindergarten through fifth grade to give all students the opportunity to improve their reading skills. In order to support all students we use Team Time groups in addition to the regular literacy instruction happening in the classroom.

Team Time is Madison Elementary's structured mentoring tutorial program which provides students in 1st through 5th grade additional strategy instruction and practice.



All students are divided into groups based on skill level in order to meet their reading needs. Students who are struggling academically, and meet the guidelines of Title I, meet in highly focused small groups. They work with interventionists to increase and apply foundational skills. Students who are at or above grade level meet in groups with grade level teachers for additional activities that enrich and challenge their learning.

Our Team Time groups meet four times per week for 30 - 35 minutes per day. These groups are closely monitored and regrouped when necessary based on students' changing needs.


# **School Medication Policy Reminder**

Spring has officially arrived and with it allergies, asthma, headaches, tummy aches, and other ailments. If your child needs to receive medication during the school day, a Medication Authorization Form must be on file for your student. This is not the same as the emergency contact sheet.

School personnel can only dispense medication to students who have a completed Medication Authorization form on file.

This is required for over-the-counter medications such as Tylenol, Motrin, and Benadryl as well as prescribed medications.

Parents may sign the form for over-the-counter medications and return to the office. Physicians are required to sign the form for prescribed medications and can fax the form to 517-265-5635.





# Eligibility and Fall Extra -Curricular Activities



The team also received recognition with an Academic All-State honorable mention.







# Meningococcal Conjugate (MCV)

MCV vaccine protects you against meningitis, which affects the brain and spinal cord.

If you contract meningitis, it can cause brain damage, severe disabilities or death.

Common symptoms include a fever, rash, headache, or stiff neck.

It is spread through close contact with an infected person, such as coughing, kissing, and sharing food or drinks. This disease is easily spread.

The first dose should be given at 11-12 years of age and the second should be given at 16. If you have not received this vaccine, make sure you get one before you get your diploma.

# Adolescent Catch-Up

Many vaccines are given during childhood to give you life-long protection against diseases.

If you have not received all of the below vaccines. it is not too late!

- 3 doses of hepatitis B vaccine (Hep B)
- 2 doses of hepatitis A vaccine (Hep A)
- 2 doses of measles. mumps, rubella vaccine (MMR)

2 doses of varicella (chickenpox) vaccine

At least 3 doses of polio vaccine (IPV or OPV)

Flu vaccine every year

These vaccines are important, especially if you plan to travel. You need all doses for full protection.

# I etanus, Diphtheria, Pertussis (Tdap)

Tdap vaccine protects you against pertussis (whooping cough), diphtheria, and tetanus.

Tetanus causes painful tightening of the muscles and is very serious. It is found in soil and enters the body through a cut or wound.

Diptheria can make you unable to breath or move body parts. It is spread by coughing or sneezing.

Pertussis can cause severe coughing and choking, making it difficult for you to breathe or eat. It is spread by coughing, sneezing or close contact with an infected person.

Tdap vaccine is usually given at the 11-12 years of age. However, anyone who has not had Tdap vaccine needs a dose.

# Papillomavirus (HPV)

**HPV** vaccine protects against cervical cancer in women and genital warts in men and women. It will also protect you against several other cancers.\*

HPV is a common infection transmitted by skin-to-skin contact during sexual activity. Even if you do not have sex, you can still get HPV. HPV infection often has no symptoms so you could have it and not know.

The best time to get HPV vaccine is at 11-12 years of age, well before sexual activity starts. However, if you missed your doses, you should still get the vaccine through 26 years of age.

This vaccine is very effective against several types of HPV and works best if you get all three doses prior to exposure.





MDE and MDCH are required by law (MCL 380.3177a) to develop and make available to schools information on meningococcal and HPV vaccines. MDCH is also required (MCL 333.9205b) to notify schools of the availability of HPV educational materials, and encourage schools to make them available to parents.

# Encourage Your Child's Creativity to Flourish

Creativity has been called a key 21st century skill. That means it—along with skills like communication and critical thinking—will help students navigate the increasingly collaborative and information-rich world that awaits them once they leave school. The arts have been shown to boost students' academic performance, perseverance, self-confidence, and more. Here are strategies for supporting your child's creativity.

Take stock of your toys. Flashy electronic toys are fun, but they don't offer children opportunities for open-ended, imaginative play. Make sure to have basic art supplies—paper, crayons, glue, clay—at home, along with toys like building blocks, puzzles, or costumes for dress-up.

**Cut the screen time.** Set limits on TV and iPad time. Try designating a certain time during the week when your entire family will put down cell phones and work on a creative project.

**Embrace mistakes.** Children who are afraid of failure are less likely to think creatively. Teach your child that mistakes are opportunities for growth. Ask, "What could you do differently next time?" Be patient with your child—and model patience as he or she learns new skills or tries a new project.

**Encourage curiosity.** Don't squelch kids' natural curiosity by being frustrated when your child asks lots of questions. Embrace it! Ask, "What if" questions, and encourage your child to use his or her imagination.

Offer constructive praise... Too much praise can make a child "hooked" on success. Instead of offering general praise ("You're so smart!"), offer specific feedback that praises your child's effort or the process he or she used ("You found a great way to paint that scene," or "I can tell you've been practicing.") Offer non-verbal praise (a hug



or a thumbs-up), or implicit encouragement by displaying your child's work on the refrigerator.

...but step back sometimes. If a child feels constantly watched, he or she may be less likely to try new ideas. Give your child space to play on his or her own. Wait until your child is finished drawing to ask what he or she has made.

Look for community resources. Check your local library, museum, or community center for art

classes or workshops to try new creative skills. Keep an eye out for poster or story contests offered by community organizations, too. Or, try teaming up with a neighbor or friend to host an art playdate. Some projects can be time-consuming or expensive, but working together with other families can help ease the burden.
