



We all hear about the "tough economic times" we are living in and are waiting for some relief. Unfortunately while we wait, our friends, neighbors, family members and maybe even we ourselves find it difficult to make ends meet. Levels of assistance through the Department of Health and Human Services have been reduced which has left many needing to find help elsewhere and not knowing how to navigate the system. 2-1-1 is the place to turn if you find yourself, or someone you know, needing assistance and not knowing where to turn.

Who Can Use 2-1-1?

Anybody. If you're looking for assistance with a problem and you don't know where to turn, or you simply want information on a particular human service issue, 2-1-1 is for you.

When Can I Call?

Anytime. 2-1-1 is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

How Does 2-1-1 Work?

Student Directory Information

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal law, requires that the Madison School District, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, the District may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of the directory information is to allow the District to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include: A playbill, showing your student's role in a drama production; the annual yearbook; honor roll or other recognition lists; graduation programs; and sports programs. Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. In addition, two federal laws require schools receiving assistance under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with three directory information categories – names, addresses, and telephone listings – unless parents have advised the school that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent. If you do not want the Madison School District or LISD to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, you must notify the Superintendent in writing by September 11, 2015. The Madison School District has designated the following information as directory information: Student's name, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, photographs and videos, degrees, honors and awards received, major field of study, and grade level.

Public Act 198 of 1971

Public Act 198 of 1971, the Mandatory Special Education Act, establishes the right to handicapped person(s) from birth through the age of 25, to equal opportunity within the public schools.

THIS MEANS THAT HANDICAPPED CHILDREN DO NOT NEED TO WAIT UNTIL THEY ARE SCHOOL AGE TO BENEFIT FROM SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES.

It is important that help be obtained for the handicapped at the earliest possible age. In the State of Michigan, this help is free and is available through your public schools. A team of educational specialists evaluate the child to determine the type and degree of disability and the best kind of program placement. This evaluation often includes medical specialists.


Pre-primary Special Education services are available for: Emotionally Impaired, Mentally Impaired, Physically & Otherwise Health Impaired (POHI), Hearing Impaired, Visually Impaired, Speech & Language Impaired, Specific Learning Disabled.

Middle & High School Dress Code Reminders

Before you head to the stores to begin your back to school shopping, please take a moment to review the Dress Code policies in place in the Middle and High Schools. A short description of what is/is not acceptable is provided here. The full Dress Code policy may be viewed on the website at: www.madisonk12.us/handbooks/.

Students shall not wear distracting and/or inappropriate clothing such as shirts, with inappropriate wording, logos that are offensive and/or are in bad taste, clothing that represents gang affiliation, or clothing that is a threat to a student's health/safety, etc.

Students shall not wear shirts and blouses that expose the midriff, and/or have a low neckline that exposes cleavage. All garments must be long enough to clearly overlap the beltline or stay tucked.

Male students must wear shirts that have sleeves. Sleeveless shirts for females are permitted if the material covering the shoulder is at least three inches wide and all undergarments are covered. Shirts should be buttoned up in front in a normal manner and cover the back completely. No cut-off shirts are permitted.

Leggings, jeggings, tights, and spandex-type bottoms (yoga pants, compression leggings, etc.) are not permitted unless worn underneath: shorts (within six inches of the top of the kneecap), skirts, or tops (within four inches of the top of the kneecap) that comply with the dress code.



Shorts must be in good taste and not shorter than either the end of one's fingertips when the arms are placed in a relaxed manner at one's side or within six inches of the top of the kneecap. Compression shorts, stretch spandex shorts, or thermal underwear are not permitted on or under clothing.

Skirts must be in good taste and within four inches of the top of the kneecap. Pants must be worn at the waist (top of the hip bone). Pants that do not stay at the waist are considered inappropriate school attire. All undergarments must be covered.

High School Culture of Achievement Program (CAP)

Students who come to class consistently unprepared, or who are inconsistent with their homework preparation do not achieve their fullest potential. When students complete their homework assignments they are acquiring the practice they need to become independent thinkers and problem solvers. The Culture of Achievement Program is a program designed to hold students accountable and encourage homework completion.

Students who come to class without completed homework will be required to stay after school to complete their missing assignment(s) in the CAP room. The CAP room is supervised by classroom teachers who are available to help students with assignments if needed. CAP runs from 2:45-4:15 p.m., and students who live within the school district are provided with transportation home. However, if a student successfully completes their assignment(s) before 4:15 p.m., they are permitted to leave with a parent/guardian.

Parents will be notified that their child has been assigned to CAP via the Blackboard Connect notification system. Students who have been assigned to the CAP Program and choose not to attend, will receive disciplinary consequences.

Due to scheduling changes in the Middle School, CAP will be held after school only in 2015-16.

Cell Phone Policy

While Madison realizes that parents may want their children to have a cell phone for family contact before or after school, there is no need for cell phones during the school day. They are a distraction and inappropriate in a classroom, the cafeteria, etc.

When students report to school their cell phones are to be immediately turned off, placed in their lockers, and left in the locker throughout the day. If a cell phone is discovered in a student's pocket, purse, etc. it will be confiscated and will be returned only as outlined in the Student Handbook.

If an emergency develops during the school day, parents may contact the High School office at 517-263-0742 and a message will be delivered to their child. We deeply appreciate your understanding and support of our cell phone policy.



Madison Middle Merit System

Students that meet the following criteria will be rewarded at the end of the first and second trimesters with the following incentives: sundae parties, bowling trip, field trip to the movies, ice-skating, possible sporting events, etc.

- (a) No more than one disciplinary referral for the trimester.
- (b) Earning no out of school suspensions or time in the Behavior Intervention Program.
- (c) Less than four countable absences for the trimester.
- (d) A grade of C- or better grade in all classes for the trimester.

The ultimate goal is to qualify for the end-of-year trip. To qualify, a student must meet requirements a-c above. In addition to those requirements, the following criteria must also be met:

(e) A student must achieve a grade of a C- or higher in all classes for the first trimester, second trimester, and the third trimester progress report. (f) A student must have qualified for one out of the two trimester merit trips.

*Students that have not qualified for the end-ofthe year trip, but choose to attend the event will be considered insubordinate and receive a 3-day suspension.

Middle School Absence Policy in Brief

There have been some important changes to the Absence Policy for 2015-16. A *summary* is available here for reference. The entire policy is available online by visiting: http://www.madisonk12.us/handbooks/ Please review this information carefully to ensure that your child does not lose credit for excessive absences.

When students are absent from school a parent/guardian must do one of the following: Call the attendance hotline for your child's school by 7:45 a.m. to notify us of the absence either on the day of the absence itself or the day that a student returns to school following an absence; or a parent may send a note with the student when the student returns to school. Absences not reported within these provisions will be unexcused and considered as truancy.

After an absence: When a student returns to school after an absence, he/she must report to the office to receive admittance "blue slip."

Accumulated absences: Upon reaching the 6th countable absence per class in a trimester and each subsequent absence up to eight, the student must make up the missed time by attending after school detention or completing assignments in the CAP program. Students that have 9 or more countable absences during a trimester will not earn credit for the trimester. A letter will notify a student of his/her 5th countable absence in a trimester class. The letter will remind parent(s)/guardian(s) and student of the required make-up time for reaching absences sixth through eight, and the failure to earn credit upon reaching the ninth countable absence. An absence report may be obtained from the office.

**A student who misses ten or more minutes at any time during a class period will incur an absence.

Attendance make up time remaining at the end of a trimester must be completed within one week after the last day of the trimester. Students are expected to spend a minimum of 60 minutes to make up each absence per class.

8th Grade Chicago Trip Information

Attention 8th Grade Students and Parents:

Last year it was voted on, through the democratic process by 8th grade students and families, that this year's class trip will be to Chicago, IL, October 27-29, 2016. The total cost of the trip, \$670, is priced for 50 participants traveling on one bus. Currently there are 49 students who have been making payments to attend the trip, which leaves 1 open seat. If your student is interested in going, they will need to make payment of \$555 (the total due thus far), to www.MYSCHOOLBUCKS.com asap. This will be a first-come first-serve basis. Once the 50th student is registered, we will have a wait list to determine if a second bus will be needed. This is contingent on there being an additional 30-40 students interested in attending the trip. Adding a second bus drastically changes the cost of the trip and without more participants there may be a cut off.



In 2001, the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) became law and is our country's most important federal education document. NCLB was designed to make changes in teaching and learning that will help increase academic achievement in our schools.

The law requires that schools receiving Title I funds notify parents of their right to obtain information about the qualifications of their child's teachers. Our elementary and our middle schools receive Title I funding and we are happy to share this information with you at your request. Nothing is more important to your child's education than having a well-prepared and highly qualified teacher. The law requires that all teachers and paraprofessionals in core content areas be "highly qualified" to teach in a school that receives Title I funding.

A "highly qualified teacher" must have:

- 1. A four-year college degree
- 2. A regular teaching certificate/license
- 3. Proof of his/her knowledge in the subject they teach

Michigan has some of the most qualified teachers in the country, and we are extremely proud of the quality of the teaching staff in the Madison School District. All of our teachers have at least a Bachelor's degree and many have advanced degrees. They all also have a State of Michigan required teaching certificate. In addition, each of our teachers is also involved in professional development activities throughout the year. All of our teachers are also evaluated annually and were determined to be effective or highly effective in their most recent evaluation.

A highly qualified teacher knows what to teach, how to teach, and has a full understanding of the subject matter being taught. We are confident that every teacher in our District is fully qualified and dedicated to teaching your child (ren).

I encourage you to support your child's education and communicate with your child's teacher(s) on a regular basis.
