From the Superintendent's Desk:

Inviting Adult Role Models, One and All

Throughout this great state of Michigan it is an exciting time as weather improves and athletic events and competitions move from inside to the outdoors. However, proper sportsmanship should occur regardless of venue. Therefore, I have included an article authored by Karissa Niehoff, NFHS Executive Director and Mark Uyl, MHSAA Executive Director regarding sportsmanship and the opportunity for individuals to serve as officials.



The National Federation of State High School Associations and its members offer the following in response to a nation-wide shortage of contest officials in school sports. The Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) is one of 51 members of the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS).

If you are the mother or father of a high school athlete here in Michigan, this message is primarily for you.

When you attend an athletic event that involves your son or daughter, cheer to your heart's content, enjoy the camaraderie that high school sports offer and have fun. But when it comes to verbally criticizing game officials or coaches, cool it.

Make no mistake about it. Your passion is admired, and your support of the hometown team is needed. But so is your self-control. Yelling, screaming and berating the officials humiliates your child, annoys those sitting around you, embarrasses your child's school and is the primary reason Michigan has an alarming shortage of high school officials.

It's true. According to a recent survey by the National Association of Sports Officials, more than 75 percent of all high school officials say "adult behavior" is the primary reason they quit. And 80 percent of all young officials hang up their stripes after just two years of whistle blowing. Why? They don't need your abuse.

Plus, there's a ripple effect. There are more officials over 60 than under 30 in many areas. And as older, experienced officials retire, there aren't enough younger ones to replace them. If there are no officials, there are no games. The shortage of registered high school officials is severe enough in some areas that athletic events are being postponed or cancelled—especially at the freshman and junior varsity levels.

Research confirms that participation in high school sports and activities instills a sense of pride in school and community, teaches lifelong lessons like the value of teamwork and self-discipline and facilitates the physical and emotional development of those who participate. So, if the games go away because there aren't enough men and women to officiate them, the loss will be infinitely greater than just an "L" on the scoreboard. It will be putting a dent in your community's future.

If you would like to be a part of the solution to the shortage of high school officials, you can sign up to become an MHSAA-registered official at MHSAA.com. Otherwise, adult role models at high school athletic events here in Michigan are always welcome.

What PARENTS SHOULD Know About Assessments

Have you ever wondered why students are given so many types of tests in school? You're not alone. Just like each subject provides students with different content and information, each type of assessment measures student learning in different ways for different purposes.

For example:

Formative Assessment is a process used by classroom teachers and students on a regular basis to confirm, adjust, and support teaching and learning.

Interim or Benchmark Assessments are given to students multiple times throughout the school year to monitor student learning toward meeting learning goals over time.

Summative Assessments are given at the end of a learning cycle to certify that learning has occurred. End-of-chapter tests are one example of summative tests given at a local level. State and federal law require all students be tested

in specific grades and subjects once a year to measure student progress in learning state content standards or other career- or college-ready goals. Our elementary and middle school assessment is called the Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress or M-STEP. The Michigan Merit Exam, or MME, is the state high school exam. Some students with disabilities take an alternative state assessment called MI-Access; English language learners are given an assessment called WIDA. Schools also have the option to use Michigan's Early Literacy and Mathematics Benchmark Assessment in grades K-2.

Reporting Assessment Results

A Parent Report of your child's assessment results is available from his or her school each fall. Statewide assessment results are reported at www.mischooldata. org through the state's new Parent Dashboard for School Transparency. In addition to test scores, the

this <u>Dashboard</u> is filled with important school-level information that parents and others say they want to know about Michigan public schools, including charter schools (www.mischooldata.org/parentdashboard).

Families and others can use the dashboard to get a more complete picture of how their child's school is serving students. They also can use the Dashboard to compare a school's performance with the average performance of other similar Michigan schools. Your ideas can make the Parent Dashboard even better! Prom will be held on Saturday, April 27 at Sauk Valley!



HS Environmental Club Gets Involved

Madison High School's Environmental Club will be working with Promedica Farms to help elementary students plant a vegetable garden this spring. Promedica Farms will be visiting classrooms to also teach lessons on nutrition. The goal will be to provide fresh vegetables to add to the Madison Food Pantry and to help all Madison students see how the seeds they planted can become vegetables in their healthy meals. We are so excited to be working with Promedica Farms.

Veggie Mobile:

The Veggie Mobile launched in 2013 by ProMedica Bixby Hospital and the Lenawee Health Network in collaboration with area farmers and producers to bring fresh and affordable produce to the residents of Lenawee County. This program currently makes 25 scheduled stops throughout the week with a goal of increasing access to fresh and affordable produce. In 2018, the Veggie Mobile served 8,226 customers (duplicative from repeat customers), had 4,366 youth visits (duplicative from classroom visits or scheduled stops on route) and donated just over 1.5 tons of produce back to the community.

Veggie Mobile will be at the Madison Little League Opening Day on Saturday, April 20!

ProMedica Farms:

To further scale fresh food access and to further address food insecurities, ProMedica Bixby Hospital established ProMedica Farms. ProMedica Farms is situated on 3 acres on M-52 in Lenawee County. The farm includes several barns, walking paths, and a hoop house for indoor growing. This is part of ProMedica's effort to encourage healthy eating and preventive care. Spring and Summer program goals are to expand educational offerings to schools and youth groups to experience first-hand how a seed in the soil can become food on your table.


Miss River Raisin Scholarship Pageant Information
